# What We Heard

This summer, Stouffville launched an online **spending simulator**, a public **feedback survey**, and **toured Town events and markets** to encourage residents to join in the budget process.

#### **Top Suggestions for 2026 Budget Priorities**

Residents were invited to share their top three suggestions for the Town of Stouffville's 2026 Budget. The responses revealed several recurring themes:

- Infrastructure (80 mentions)
- Recreation (58 mentions)
- **Service Improvements** (55 mentions)
- **Downtown Revitalization** (41 mentions)
- 5 Affordability and Taxes (36 mentions)
- **Environmental Sustainability** (11 mentions)

#### **Overall Conclusion**

The results revealed a community that is deeply invested in the quality and sustainability of municipal services. Residents prioritize infrastructure, service maintenance, and recreation, while also calling for transparency, digital accessibility, and fiscal responsibility.
