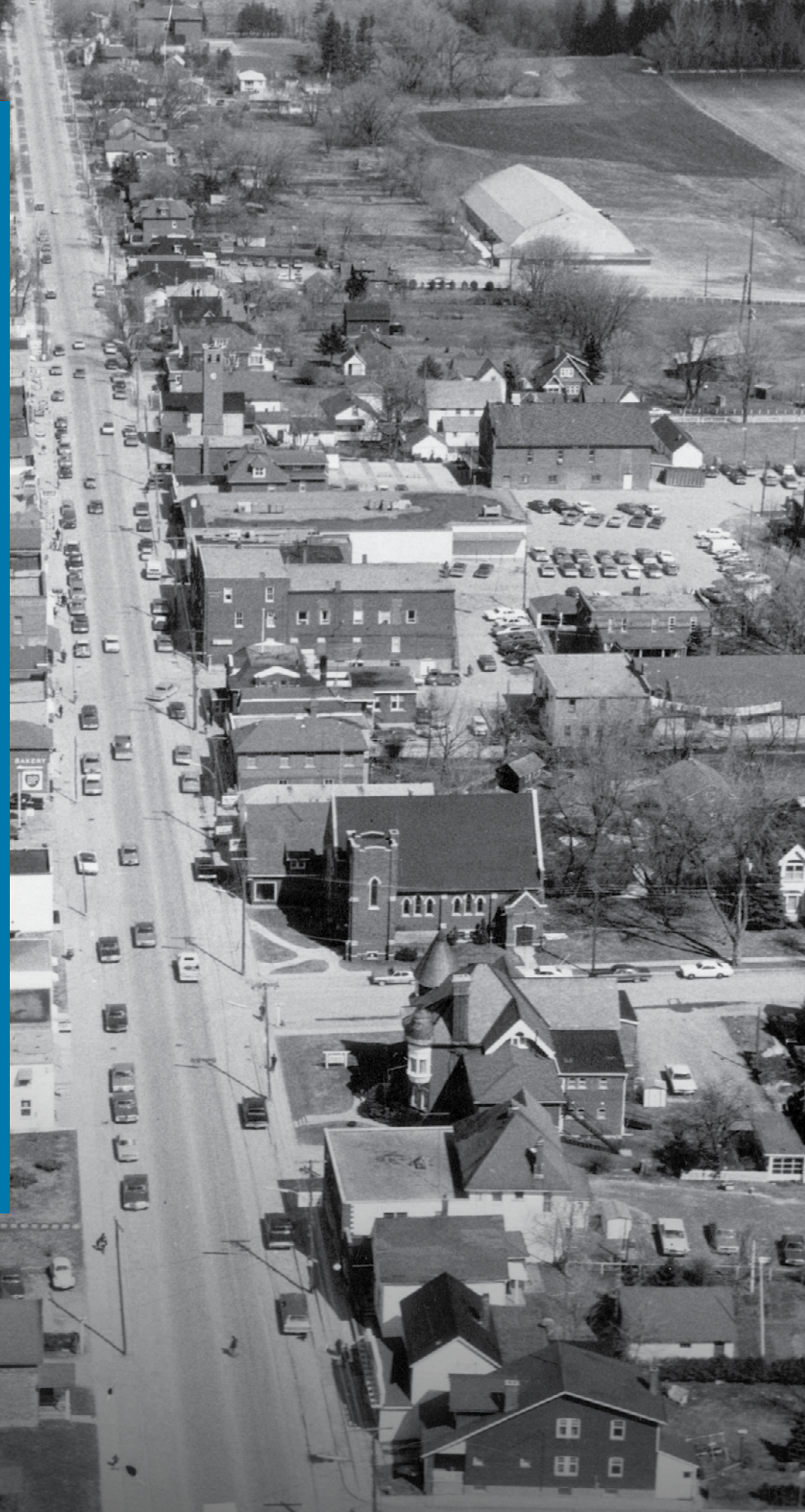


2026/27 residents' guide

A step back in time...

Comprising over 200 square kilometres of lush forest and farmland, our home was created as a governmental entity in 1971 when the Township of Whitchurch, the Village of Stouffville, and a portion of the Township of Markham, consolidated into what we today call Whitchurch-Stouffville. But our history goes back much further than that.

The history of Whitchurch-Stouffville spans thousands of years and reflects a rich legacy shaped by Indigenous cultures, early European settlement, and steady community development.

Long before European arrival, the land was home to Indigenous peoples, including the Anishinaabeg, Wendat, and Haudenosaunee. In the 1500s, a large Wendat village occupied part of what is now Whitchurch-Stouffville. Archaeological excavations conducted in the early 2000s identified this settlement as the Mantle Site, later renamed the Jean-Baptiste Lainé Site in honour of a decorated Wendat Second World War veteran. Additional pre-contact Indigenous village sites have also been identified throughout the area, underscoring the region's long human history.

European settlement began in the late 18th century, following established Indigenous trail systems that later

influenced road development. In 1792, Whitchurch Township was created as one of ten townships in York County and was named after Whitchurch in Herefordshire, England, the birthplace of Elizabeth Simcoe, wife of Upper Canada's Lieutenant Governor John Graves Simcoe. Settlers arrived throughout the 1790s, establishing farms and small communities across the township. Prior to 1794, settlers documented several major trail networks, including routes that paralleled present-day Yonge Street, the Vandorf Trail connecting the Rouge River system to Newmarket, and the Rouge Trail extending northwest from Musselman's Lake.

A defining moment occurred in 1804 when families from Pennsylvania, including the Stouffers and Reesors, arrived in the area after a six-week journey through largely unsettled land. Abraham Stouffer and his wife Elizabeth Reesor settled near Duffin's Creek in what would become

Mayor & Reeves

The Stouffville Reeves and Mayors: A Brief History micro-exhibit at Town Hall offers a concise look at the political leadership that has shaped Whitchurch-Stouffville. Located at 111 Sandiford Drive, the exhibit traces local governance from Indigenous leadership through township days, the era of reeves, and the transition to mayors following amalgamation in 1971. Historical photographs and interpretive panels highlight the individuals and decisions that helped guide the community's growth and civic identity.

Stouffville. Between 1817 and 1824, Abraham Stouffer built several mills, including a grist mill near present-day Main Street and Market Street. These mills became the economic and social centre of a growing hamlet known as "Stoufferville", attracting additional settlers and businesses.

Throughout the 19th century, the community continued to formalize. In 1832, a post office was established, officially naming the settlement "Stouffville". Municipal organization followed in 1850 under the Baldwin Act, creating structured local governance for Whitchurch Township. As populations increased, several communities separated from the township to form their own municipal governments. Stouffville incorporated as a village in 1877, marking an important milestone in its development.

The late 19th and early 20th centuries saw the construction of landmarks that reflected Stouffville's growing civic and social life. The Mansion House Hotel, built in 1880 beside the train station, was considered a luxury destination of its time. In 1896, Nineteen on the Park was constructed as a market and dance hall and later served many community functions. The Village of Stouffville's Clock Tower, completed in 1931, became a lasting civic symbol.

In 1923, the Williams Treaties were signed, transferring large areas of land, including Whitchurch, from Indigenous peoples to the governments of Canada and Ontario, with legal discussions continuing well into the 21st century. In 1971, Whitchurch Township and the Village of Stouffville, along with portions of Markham Township, amalgamated to form the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

150th Anniversary

Stouffville will mark a major milestone next year as it celebrates its 150th anniversary, commemorating its incorporation as a village in 1877. The anniversary will honour Indigenous history, early settlers, and generations of residents who shaped the community. A year-long program of special events, celebrations, and activities is planned, inviting the community to reflect on the past and celebrate Stouffville's future together with pride and purpose.

Today, the Town balances continued growth with environmental stewardship, including significant land protection under the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan, while maintaining a strong sense of community and connection to its history.

The idea for the Whitchurch-Stouffville Museum & Community Centre began in 1969 as a civic-minded project by a group of local residents with a passion for Canadian history and a love of their town.

Since 1971, the site has grown from the original museum building – the Bogarttown School House (1857) – and now features the Vandorf Public School (1870), a log cabin (c. 1850), a Victorian-era farmhouse (c. 1860), a historic barn, and an outhouse. The Museum also houses and preserves over 16,000 artifacts in its collection!

Conservation areas & national parks

Bruce's Mill Conservation Area

South side of Stouffville Road, between Warden Avenue and Kennedy Road

Bruce's Mill Conservation Area takes its name from a restored water-powered mill located on a tributary of the Rouge River. The 10km of trails in this area are both open and forested. In addition to hiking activities, there are countless ways to spend time here, such as picnicking, biking, or exploring the forests by Treetop Trekking. In the spring, Bruce's Mill is home to the Sugar Bush Festival.

Pangman Springs Conservation Area

Kennedy Road, between Davis Drive and Aurora Road

A 100-hectare property on the Oak Ridges Moraine, Pangman Springs Conservation Area is an excellent example of a mature moraine ecosystem, including both wetlands and upland hardwood forests. The public can access the conservation area from the parking lot on Kennedy Road, or from a side trail connected to the nearby Porritt tract of the York Regional Forest.

Whitchurch Conservation Area

South side of Aurora Road, between Warden Avenue and Kennedy Road

Whitchurch Conservation Area is an 11 hectare, mainly wooded property, sitting on the northern edge of the Oak Ridges Moraine. This property contains a rich collection of bird species, as well as a variety of ecological communities. Featuring a quaint pond, this property can be noisy with the croaks of busy frogs in the springtime. This is a perfect place for a family hike!

Rouge National Urban Park

Access point on 19th Avenue, between Ninth and Tenth Line

A rich assembly of natural, cultural and agricultural landscapes, Rouge National Urban Park is home to amazing biodiversity, some of the last remaining working farms in the Greater Toronto Area, Carolinian ecosystems, one of the region's largest marshes, a beach at Lake Ontario, amazing hiking opportunities, and human history dating back over 10,000 years.

York Regional Forest

Connect with nature and enjoy fresh air while exploring the York Regional Forest. The Forest has more than 150 kilometres of scenic trails for you to discover. More than half of the forested areas are located in Stouffville, where three accessible trails make it easy to enjoy time among the trees!



The York Regional Forest is open to the public 365 days per year with no cost to enter. The Forest is over 2,600 hectares and is made up of 24 Forest Tracts (22 of which are open to the public) located in different parts of the Region.

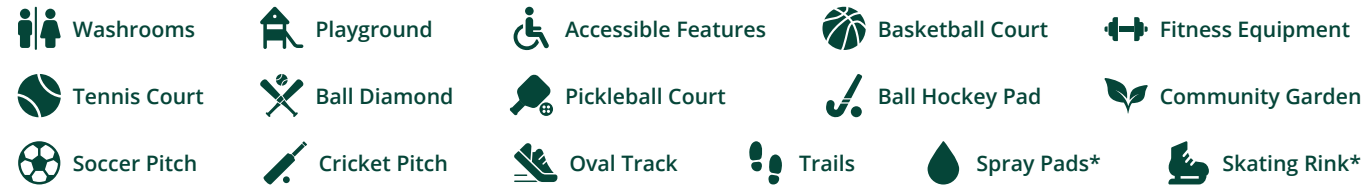
Located at the south end of Memorial Park, adjacent to Hoover Park Drive, the Wayne Emmerson Skate Park is approximately 5000 sq. ft. and offers features suitable for varying age groups and skill levels. It has been named after former Mayor, Wayne Emmerson.



Skating / Multi Purpose Trail

Located in Memorial Park, the Skating / Multi-Purpose Trail is a 275-metre, fully accessible trail designed for year-round use. During the warmer months, it supports walking, running, and cycling. In winter, the trail is maintained as an outdoor skating loop, with refrigeration technology helping to extend the skating season. Designed to accommodate a range of activities and abilities, the trail is accessible for individuals, families, and users of all skill levels, making it a versatile and well-loved community amenity.

Transit

On-Request Service

Mobility On-Request (MOR) is a ride-sharing service that allows you to request transit when and where you need it. It allows travel from your selected address in the service area to one of five select locations in Stouffville. Download the Mobility On-Request App, available in the App Store or Google Play. MOR also offers an on-request transit service for seniors 65 years and older.

Mobility On-Request Paratransit:

MOR Paratransit is York Region's door-to-door, shared ride, accessible public transit service for people with disabilities. If you are unable to use regular public transit due to a physical, cognitive, visual, or sensory disability for all or part of your trip, Paratransit may be for you. GO Transit

GO Transit, a division of Metrolinx, is the regional public transit service for the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area. Its routes extend to communities across the Greater Golden Horseshoe. GO Transit offers trains and buses to/from Stouffville including bus line 70 and 71 and the train line "Stouffville Line." GO train services along the Stouffville line have recently opened weekend train trips.

Road operations

As part of the Town’s Engineering and Public Works Commission, the Operations Division is responsible for road construction and maintenance, winter snow removal, traffic control, sidewalks, streetlights, and crossing guards.

Stouffville manages the operation and maintenance of municipal roads and sidewalks. Some maintenance is scheduled to occur annually; however, most is scheduled for maintenance as specific needs arise. Any issues reported by the public are tracked and repaired on a priority basis. To report an issue or for general inquiries, please contact our Customer Service Centre.

Road Watch program

The Town is a participant in York Regional Police’s Road Watch Program. Residents can report dangerous or unlawful driving behaviour through the York Regional Police online portal, onlinereporting.yrp.ca/RoadWatch

Roundabouts

The maintenance of many of Stouffville’s residential roundabouts are under the jurisdiction of the Town. They are swept, plowed, and painted on a regular basis. The larger Bloomington Road roundabout was built and is maintained by the Province of Ontario. For more information about roundabout safety, visit townofws.ca/roundabouts

Sidewalks

Trip ledges, cracks, and other sidewalk damage are repaired on a priority basis by the Town, as necessary. If required, major sections of damaged sidewalks and curbs are replaced and nearby residents are notified in advance.

Snow removal

Road patrols are carried out by the Town each morning commencing at 4:00 AM, seven days a week, starting on the third Friday of November. The Town is responsible for clearing Town roads, and all sidewalks when snow accumulation reaches five centimetres. The plowing of high-traffic roadways and moderate-traffic roads that connect to residential streets are prioritized first as these roads are major carriers of traffic. Residential roads are cleared once these main roadway arteries are completed. The Town does not maintain sidewalks on private property such as condominiums and commercial properties.

Storm sewers & catchbasins

Storm sewers, catchbasins, maintenance holes, curbs and gutters are inspected annually and repaired as required. Cleaning of catchbasins is done on an as-needed basis.

Street sweeping

The Town begins its annual Spring Sweeping Program at the end of April each year, weather permitting. This effort clears all Town streets of sand and debris that build up on streets through the winter. The street sweeping usually continues through the course of the summer.

Streetlights

The Town is always seeking the assistance of residents in reporting streetlight outages. This may be done at any time by calling the Customer Service Centre with a detailed description of the location of the streetlight. Streetlights are generally repaired within ten business days.

Windrow clearing service

The Town of Stouffville provides a free Windrow Clearing Program for eligible seniors (65+) and residents with physical disabilities who have no able-bodied person in the household to assist with clearing snowbanks at the end of their driveways.

Trees

Stouffville recognizes the ecological and aesthetic value of trees and the importance of the canopy cover they provide.



Residents are not permitted to hardscape around Town trees. This includes building decorative walls or laying artificial turf around the tree. Many forms of hardscaping will restrict the tree’s root growth and will kill the tree. Trees on private property are the responsibility of the homeowner.

Waste collection

The Town has contracted the collection of all garbage, organics, yard waste and appliances to GFL Environmental Inc. Call GFL for inquiries related to missed collections, replacement of damaged Town issued green bins, and new resident bin delivery.



Place by curb

All waste must be placed at the curb by 7:00 AM on your scheduled collection day, but not earlier than 5:00 PM the night before.



Limits

There is a three bag or container limit (max. 125L). Additional bags will also be collected, provided a Garbage Bag Tag is affixed to each bag for a limit of 6 bags per household per collection.

Recycling

As of December 31, 2025 the Town of Stouffville is no longer responsible for providing recycling collection. Recycling is now collected by the Province of Ontario and Circular Materials. Please contact their contractor directly at 1(833) 779-4351 or by e-mail at n6recycling@gflenv.com for information on the new recycling program.

Green bins

Stouffville's Green Bin program helps keep food waste out of landfill. Green bins must not exceed 22kgs (50lbs). All green bin material must be placed inside the bin in compostable bags that are securely closed or tied. Only Town issued green bins will be accepted for collection. Lids of green bins should be closed and locked when set out for collection. Green bins with materials overflowing will not be collected. Broken or cracked bins can be exchanged for no charge. Broken bin must be present at time of the exchange.

Yard waste

Yard Waste is collected on your regular collection day every second week starting in April, as noted throughout your Waste Collection Calendar (there are some exceptions due to statutory holidays). There is no limit on the amount of yard waste that can be placed for collection, providing that acceptable bags and/or containers are used.



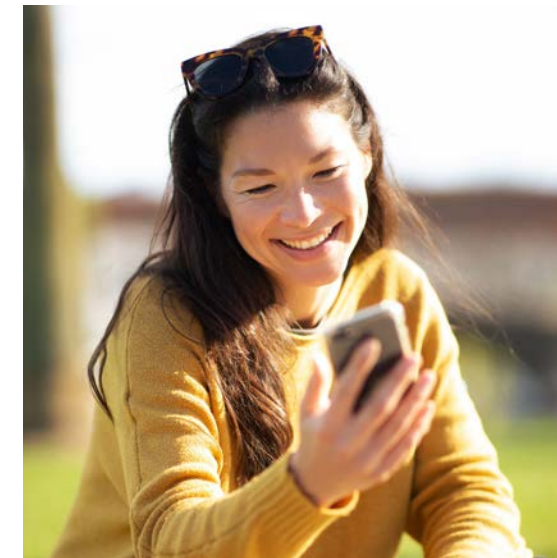
Acceptable

Place weeds, plant trimmings, and leaves in paper yard waste bags or an open-top garbage can labelled "Yard Waste" (stickers available from the Municipal Offices). Blue boxes are for recycling material only and will not be accepted for yard waste collection. No plastic bags please.



Unacceptable

Kitchen scraps, grass clippings, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, larger branches, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood, and animal droppings. Please do not place yard waste bags at the curb before collection day. Bags left outdoors in the elements deteriorate very quickly and can cause problems for collection crews by ripping or falling apart. Crews are not responsible for collecting ripped or torn bags.

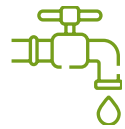

Drinking water

The Town provides clean, safe drinking water which meets all of the Ontario Drinking Water Quality Standards. It is tested at an accredited laboratory licensed by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks.



Water supply

Stouffville purchases its water from the Region of York. The Region operates and maintains seven ground wells and supplements this water supply by purchasing treated lake water from the City of Toronto. Stouffville is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the water distribution systems in Stouffville, Ballantrae, and Musselman's Lake.



Private wells

The Town is not responsible for well water or private well systems. All residents on a private water supply, particularly those with shallow dug wells, are recommended to sample their water supply on a regular basis. Testing kits are available for pick-up at the Municipal Offices, 111 Sandiford Drive.

Septic systems

Did you know that septic systems are the responsibility of the homeowner? It is up to you to keep your system working properly to protect your environment, your health, and your investment.



If you live in a more rural area of our community, chances are you have a septic system.

Septic systems are onsite treatment units that eliminate the need for municipal sewers in rural areas. Anything that goes down the drain – every shower drip and every toilet flush – flows to the septic system. Septic systems are comprised of a tank, a network of pipes, and billions of organisms that process your waste. It is important to know that you are responsible for your septic system and that it is in your best interest to take good care of it – from a health, financial, and environmental perspective.

Community safety

Stouffville Fire & Emergency Services is made up of volunteer and career personnel that provide public education, inspections, and emergency response to the community.

Fire safety starts with you

Early detection and a home escape plan are essential to protect your family in the event of a fire emergency. Ensure that your home is equipped with operational smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every level of your home and outside sleeping areas. In addition to working alarms, plan and practice your home fire escape plan so everyone knows what to do in an emergency. Burning

A burn permit is required for certain types of outdoor fires in the Town of Stouffville. If you plan to burn yard waste on your property - such as dry brush, untreated wood, or other natural organic material - you must first obtain a permit. Open-air burn permits allow fires no larger than two metres in diameter and two metres in height. Fires must also be located at least 10 metres from any building, fence, roadway, or other structure.

A permit is not required for small recreational fires using clean wood in a fire pit or chiminea, when used for enjoyment, cooking, religious ceremonies, or similar purposes. For more information, call 905-640-9595 or visit townofws.ca/fire.

Parking

Stouffville uses proactive and complaint-based parking enforcement. Contact our Central Customer Service Centre at (905) 640-1900 if you have a parking complaint or an enforcement concern.

Parking permits

Are you having overnight guests? Or repairing your driveway? Or just need to park on your street for more than three hours at a time? You can get a free parking exemption!

Remember: Parking permits are not valid during winter maintenance activities (i.e. snow flurries, snow clearing, and sanding/salting operations, etc.).

Permits cannot be used for commercial vehicles, including but not limited to boats, trailers, school buses, recreational vehicles, etc.

Parking allowances

There is a 3-hour parking limit on most residential streets between the hours of 2:00 AM and 9:00 PM and for Main Street between the hours of 2:00 AM to 6:00 PM. No signs are required.

Winter parking restrictions take effect on December 1 and last until March 31. During this time parking is not allowed on residential streets overnight between the hours of 2:00 AM and 6:00 AM regardless of duration or during snow clearing operations.

Violations

Vehicles found to be violating the Town's parking restrictions may be ticketed and/or towed. Residents are also reminded not to park in accessible parking spaces without a valid permit (that is properly displayed) and that parking is never allowed in a Fire Route. Vehicles may be ticketed and/or towed if found in these areas.

AMPS

Administrative Monetary Penalty System (AMPS) allows individuals to dispute a Penalty Notice through a streamlined, ticketless process, offering a fair and efficient alternative to the provincial court system.

Online

Visit paytickets.townofws.ca to pay or appeal a Penalty Notice, register for on-street parking permits, or register for facility lot parking permits for longer parking needs.

By mail

Write parking ticket number on front of cheque or money order, payable to "The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville".

Drop box

Place your ticket in an envelope labeled "Attn: Administrative Monetary Penalty System" with cheque or money order (no cash) in the secure 24-hour drop box located beside the main entrance of the Municipal Offices.

In-person

Pay directly at Town Hall Customer Service, Mon. to Fri. 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM, except on civic/statutory holidays.

Animal services

The Town is responsible for a **wide variety of Animal Services** including enforcement of the Town's Animal Services Bylaw and response for sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife.

Sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife

If you see a sick or injured wild animal, contact us immediately. Do not touch or contain it. For orphaned baby animals, call 905-640-1900 ext. 2230, as some species leave their young unattended for long periods. Our Animal Services officers collaborate with wildlife veterinarians and rehab centers to safely care for and release wildlife.

Dog tags & licensing

Welcoming a pet brings love and companionship. Responsible ownership ensures a long, happy life together. If your dog is lost, licensing helps reunite you quickly. Get dog tags online at townofws.ca/dogtags or at Town Hall.

Building & renovations

The Town's Building Services Division is responsible for the administration of the Ontario Building Code Act and related Building By-Laws.

Building Permits

If you are considering doing work to your home or property, a building permit may be required. This may include adding a room, finishing your basement, or building a garage.

✓ Some projects that **require a building permit** include, but are not restricted to:

- Finishing a basement
- Installing a pool and surrounding fence
- Building a deck if they are more than 2 feet above ground
- Building a residential addition (sunroom, family room, second suite, etc.)
- Additional dwelling units (basement apartments, second suites)
- Detached storage sheds that are greater than 15m²
- Detached accessory structure (gazebo) that are greater than 10m²
- Adding a new window or door opening, or widening an existing window or door

✗ Some projects where **building permits are not necessary** include, but are not restricted to:

- Re-roofing (light-weight) that does not exceed the structural capacity of the framing
- Wood decks with a surface that is equal to, or less than, 600mm above ground
- Window and door replacement provided that the size is not increased
- Replacing windows or doors in existing openings
- Detached storage sheds that are less than 15m²
- Detached accessory structure (gazebo) that are less than 10m²

Swimming pools

If you are installing an above-ground pool, in-ground pool, or blow-up/ temporary pool kit (containing more than 2 feet of water) on your property, the fence (enclosure) surrounding the swimming pool requires a permit. During construction of the pool, the owner must provide a safe temporary fence around the pool.

Basements

Finishing a previously unfinished area of your home requires a building permit. A residential renovation or alteration to your home can include enlarging a window or door, adding or removing a wall, or finishing a basement. If any renovation includes a new washroom or alterations to the existing plumbing, a plumbing permit is required. If your home is serviced by an on-site private sewage disposal system, a septic system evaluation report may also be required.

Additions

Residential additions require a building permit. If the addition includes a washroom or alterations to existing plumbing, a plumbing permit is required. If your home is serviced by an on-site private sewage disposal system, a septic system evaluation report may be required. If any electrical work is proposed (lighting, wiring, switches, and outlets, for example) contact the Electrical Safety Authority at 1(877) 372-7233 for information regarding permits and permit fees.

Decks

Residents are allowed to build a deck if it is less than 600mm above the ground. Our Zoning By-laws restrict decks to the rear and side yards only. You may require Toronto and Region Conservation Authority or the Lake Simcoe Conservation Authority approval if your property is on or near a floodplain, and your condo board may need to approve the deck if your home is not free-hold.

Driveways & boulevards

Where a portion of the work involves permanent change to public property (such as driveway widening and entrance relocations, landscape, or interlock work) an encroachment permit is required.

Fences

If you plan to build a fence on your property line, you are encouraged to meet with your neighbours to discuss design and cost before constructing it. No permit is required for division fences. Residential rear or side yard fences cannot exceed 2.2 metres in height, while front yard fences cannot exceed 1.0 metres in height.

Using the road?

You'll need a Road Occupancy Permit. Residents are required to obtain this permit if you are doing work to your property that requires occupying the Town's right-of-way or road for any length of time (such as for material or bin storage).

Property taxes

Property tax bills are mailed to each property owner end of January and end of June each year. Instalments are due mid-February, April, July, and September.

How are your taxes calculated?

Your taxes are calculated on the assessed value of your property as reported by the Municipal Property and Assessment Corporation and multiplied by the current tax rate. The municipal tax rate is determined by Stouffville Council near the beginning of each year.

How are your tax dollars spent?

Only a portion of your tax dollars goes to the Town of Stouffville. In 2024, 35% went to the Town, 19% went to the Province, and 45% went to York Region.

Water & waste water

Water bills are due four times per year, with due dates in January and April being billed at the previous year's rates, and due dates in July and October billed at the current year's rates.

What does your water bill pay for?

Each year Stouffville sets the water and sewer rate based on the cost of delivering these services. The rates ensure sufficient funding is received to pay for:

- Supply of drinking water from York Region
- Sewage treatment provided by York Region
- Costs required to operate and maintain the water and sewer systems

Water and sewer billing revenue is used exclusively to fund the operation and maintenance of the municipal water and sewer system.

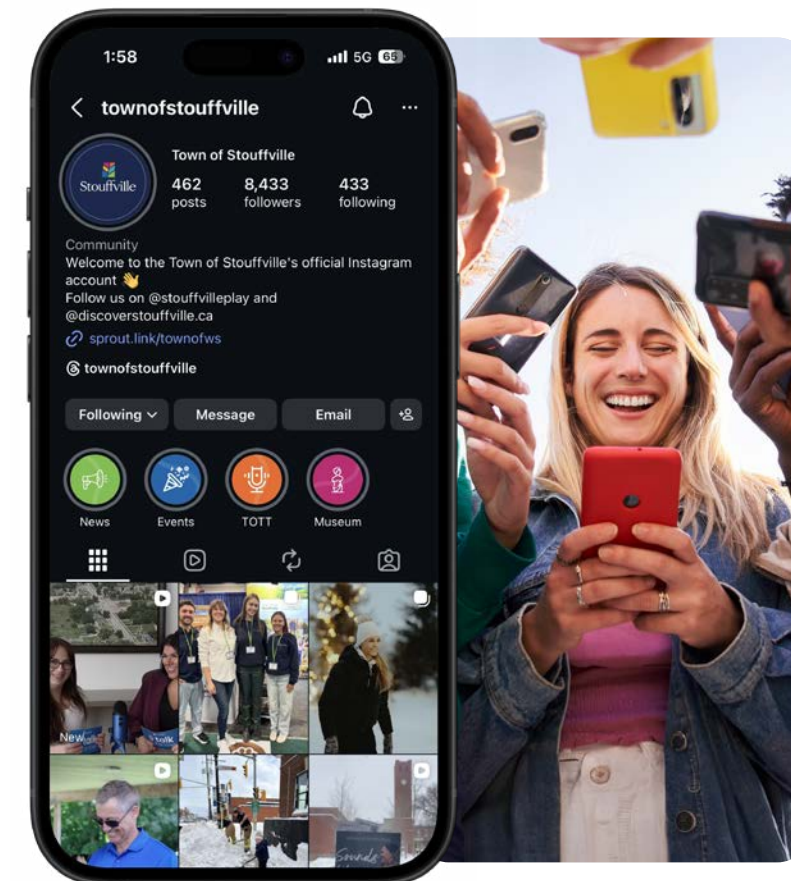
